Introduction

This guide provides sources of grant funding for public and private institutions of higher education, as well as libraries. Using this guide, colleges, universities, and libraries in the Top 20 states will be able to find a variety of federal, state, and private funding sources.

Higher Education's Obligations under Section 504 and Title II of the ADA

In 1973, Congress passed Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (Section 504), a law that prohibits discrimination on the basis of physical or mental disability. Section 504 regulation applies to all recipients of this funding, including colleges, universities, and postsecondary vocational education and adult education programs. Failure by these higher education schools to provide auxiliary aids to students with disabilities that results in a denial of a program benefit is discriminatory and prohibited by Section 504.

The Section 504 regulation contains the following requirement relating to a postsecondary school's obligation to provide auxiliary aids to qualified students who have disabilities: "A recipient . . . shall take such steps as are necessary to ensure that no handicapped student is denied the benefits of, excluded from participation in, or otherwise subjected to discrimination under the education program or activity operated by the recipient because of the absence of educational auxiliary aids for students with impaired sensory, manual, or speaking skills."

Other laws such as Title II of the ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) and Section 508 provide additional protections to people with physical or mental impairments, including those who are blind or have learning disabilities. Title II requires that public education give people with disabilities an equal opportunity to benefit from all of their programs, services, and activities. Section 508 requires federal electronic and information technology to be accessible to people with disabilities including formats for people with visual impairments or who are deaf or hard of hearing. Some individuals with disabilities may need accessibility-related software or peripheral devices in order to use systems that comply with Section 508.

Postsecondary Student Responsibilities

A postsecondary student with a disability who is in need of auxiliary aids is obligated to provide notice of the nature of the disabling condition to the college and to assist it in identifying appropriate and effective auxiliary aids. In elementary and secondary schools,

teachers and school specialists may have arranged support services for students with disabilities. However, in postsecondary schools, the students themselves must identify the need for an auxiliary aid and give adequate notice of the need. The student's notification should be provided to the appropriate representative of the college who, depending upon the nature and scope of the request, could be the school's Section 504 or ADA coordinator, an appropriate dean, a faculty advisor, or a professor. Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA)

The Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) provides over \$235 million per year in grants to libraries to improve library services and to promote targeted library services to people of diverse geographic, cultural, and socioeconomic backgrounds, to individuals with disabilities, and to people with limited functional literacy or information skills.

The federal government provides these funds to the states where they are then made available to all libraries serving the public including town, school, and college. In the US there are approximately 16,000 public libraries, 4,000 academic libraries, and 75,000 public school libraries most of which are eligible for LSTA grants to purchase assistive reading technology. Contact your State Library Agency for information on competitive grants The Web site URLs for each State Library Agency are listed under the individual states later in the document. Grants are available to purchase assistive technology, such as Kurzweil 3000, to help individuals with disabilities and people with limited functional literacy or informational skills access library services.

Federal Grant Programs for Higher Ed

There are a number of federal grant programs available to higher education through a variety of government agencies.

US Department of Education (ED)

ED is providing about \$2.5 billion to help strengthen teaching and learning in colleges and other postsecondary institutions.

State Grant Programs for Higher Ed

Each state's Department of Education has a variety of grant programs available. Most of these grants are for K-12 schools, but they do provide additional grants for public, post-secondary schools including community colleges, state colleges and universities. The Web site URLs for each of the states Department of Education are listed under the individual states later in the document.

Foundation Funding for Higher Ed

Private Foundations: Non-profit organizations with an endowment usually donated from a single source, such as an individual or family. Best known examples include Rockefeller Foundation, Gates Foundation, and the Doris Duke Foundation, but there are many smaller foundations. There are over 20,000 foundations in the US with over \$300 billion in assets and they will be distributing \$14 billion in funds in 2003. Foundation Research: Before applicants prepare and submit a grant proposal, they should research the foundations that they are targeting to make sure that their project is in an area the foundations are interested in funding. Additionally, many foundations limit their grant making to certain geographical locations, so applicants will need to make sure that their organization is located in a region that the foundation(s) support.

Application Guidelines: Most foundations have an application process and specify deadlines that must be met to successfully obtain a grant. Applicants should first check the foundation's Web site, if one exists, for guidelines on the application process. Some foundations request a letter of inquiry before the submission of a proposal. Many foundations request that applicants use the Common Grant Proposal Form from the Associated Grant Makers <http://www.agmconnect.org> when submitting a grant proposal. Kurzweil 3000 Software in Higher Education

Introduction

Students at the college level who struggle to learn because of dyslexia, attention deficit disorder, short term memory loss and other learning disabilities are faced with significant challenges to success in academic studies in higher education. Test Taking

"Benefits of Assistive Reading Software for Students with Attention Disorders"

This study investigated how assistive reading software affected the reading performance of a group of 20 post-secondary students who had a primary diagnosis of attention disorder. These students used assistive reading software for most of a semester to read assignments for an English class and in testing sessions in which comparisons were made between normal, unassisted reading and reading assisted by the software. This software provides a synchronized visual and auditory presentation of text and incorporates study skills tools for highlighting and note taking. Attention measures, reading speed, comprehension scores, and attitude questionnaire responses were obtained during these sessions. The principal findings were that the assistive software allowed the students to attend better to their reading, to reduce their distractibility, to read with less stress and fatigue, and to read for longer periods of time. It helped them to read faster and thereby to complete reading assignments in less time. It did not have a significant effect on comprehension, but it helped some students whose comprehension was very poor. The study results indicate that assistive reading software should be considered as a significant intervention to assist students who have attention disorders and as an accommodation to help them compensate for their disabilities.

"The Lexia Institute conducted a study of the efficacy of the Kurzweil 3000 in improving the reading performance of a group of community college students with diagnosed learning disabilities. They found that the Kurzweil 3000 provided substantial assistance to most of the students in this group by increasing their reading rate and comprehension and increasing the length of time that their attention to reading could be sustained. It made reading less stressful, and less tiring, and almost all participants indicated that they would like to use the Kurzweil 3000 for their reading.
